



## St George's Churchyard, Modbury - Citizen Science Ecological Surveys - Summer 2024




#### Mini Bioblitz of Invertebrates July 28th 2024 in St George's, Modbury, Churchyard.

After surveys of plants, birds and a few insects in previous years, and inspired by the need for knowledge and conservation of insects, we focused on these in the summer of 2024. A survey was carried out with sweep nets, bug pots, lenses and a very detailed Invertebrate ID book, by citizen scientists who are learning, year on year, a little more about the complexity of identifying insects. We focused on insects, due to the very worrying decline in their numbers over recent years. Insects (butterflies, moths, bees, flies, wasps and many other species) pollinate our plants. Without them, there will be no fruit, vegetables or cereals for us to eat, as we depend on them for our food. Bats, birds and moths depend on insects to eat too.

Invertebrates include all living things, including insects, that do not have a spine or backbone. Insects have 6 legs and there are over 25,000 species in the UK, accounting for 80% of all living creatures! Insects live on, in, feed and breed on many different plants. The wider the diversity of plant species, forms and conditions where they grow, the larger the variety and number of different invertebrates they will support. This has been borne out in our mini survey this summer (see the churchyard map on the next page) with:

- 20 species of insect identified in the 2021 survey area (amongst the pollarded ash trees in the SE corner of the churchyard),
- 16 species identified in the 2022 survey area (amongst the Rowan trees in the SW corner of the churchyard)
- 4 species of insect identified to the north of the Church in the mown area.
- 4 Species of butterfly were seen flying around the boundary of the Churchyard, near the northern hedge.





With its theme of invertebrates, ModWAG organised our first moth identification in the churchyard on Friday 16th August 2024. This was thanks to Richard Moore who has an amazing knowledge of moths and insects, and fantastic photography skills too. He brought along a friend from Dartmouth, so we had two moth traps. We stopped a little earlier than we had hoped due to a family of hornets that are nesting (very beautifully) in Churchgate's barn and who decided the moth trap lights were very inviting. They hunt moths and other insects to feed their young. They eat plants and only sting humans if they feel under threat.

Despite this, Richard has photographed and identified all the moths seen. Hornets hunt moths and the long grass had been cut, so the odds were against us finding many. A few images are on the next page. We caught around 10 different species, many that rely on long grasses, oak, hawthorn and blackthorn for food and shelter.

Moths found on the evening 16th August 2024, along the hedged easterly boundary after a long-grass cut, with a finish at 10.00pm due to hornets:

Orange Swift - feeds on roots of dandelion and other plants

**Light brown apple moth** - originally from Australia

Rosy Footman - feeds on lichen on oak trees

**Straw dot** - feeds on a variety of grasses

Brimstone - (a butterfly) feeds on hawthorn and blackthorn

Common marbled Carpet - feeds on low growing plants/ bedstraws/ cleavers

Grass veneer - feeds on grasses over 15cm from the ground

Iron prominent - feeds on birches, hazel, oaks and alder

Oak Egar - feeds on blackthorn, hazel, bramble and hawthorn

Jersey tiger - Seen mainly in S Devon, day-time moth, feeding on nettles and other flowering plants cont. over

#### Modbury Parish Council Meeting Tuesday 3rd December 2024, 7pm

#### **Public Forum**

Three members of the public attended our December meeting. We had been expecting a visit from the producer of the proposed South Hams Festival, but the festival has been postponed.



We thank Sally (the outgoing parish clerk) for her work and are pleased to welcome our  $MOI_{p}$  new Parish Clerk, Bleddyn Griffiths (Griff).

Griff will be in the office between 10am and 5.30pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays starting 17th December.

#### **Modbury Flood Alleviation**

Rob West gave an update on the effectiveness of the Modbury flood alleviation scheme. The recent storms have activated the scheme for the first time since its installation in 2018 and it has been very effective in slowing the water run-off – ultimately stopping Modbury from flooding. We are very pleased that there is spare capacity of 70% to cope should we be unlucky enough to experience even more rainfall than the recent storms have delivered!

We are very disappointed to have had our grant application of 25% towards the cost of road ploughing to help alleviate flooding problems turned down by Devon County Council recently and DCC Cllr Rufus Gilbert is going to follow this up.

We will be reviewing our response to the recent weather before meeting with DCC in January to review the joint working arrangement.

Many thanks to Rob West as Road Warden and Cllr Bill Cole as Lengthsman and their teams for their hard work to date in repairing the potholes and clearing the drains.

#### Report from DCC Cllr Rufus Gilbert

- DCC are likely to be introducing a 5% increase in their precept for 2025/26.
- Repairs to the A379 adjacent to the Industrial estate will be undertaken soon in response to public complaints and a more permanent repair will take place in February 2025.
- Rufus Gilbert wished the outgoing Clerk best wishes for the future and thanked her for all her hard work for Modbury Parish Council.

#### Cllr Bernard Taylor (SHDC) sent apologies

#### Matters arising from previous meetings

- Flooding at Orcheton Cllr Ann Turner is arranging a meeting in January with all interested parties.
- Grass verge A379 SHDC have accepted they are responsible for the maintenance of this verge and have now included it in their grass cutting schedule. Cllr Bill Cole will liaise with SHDC for work to be done on the trees obscuring the light.
- We have submitted a strong objection to the proposed increase in parking charges for visitors to the area. We understand that a paper on this was considered by SHDC Executive on 4<sup>th</sup> December and Full Council on 5<sup>th</sup> December. We are very disappointed not to have been consulted on this alongside other towns in the South Hams and will be monitoring progress with the proposal.

#### Memorial Hall Play Area

We have received three tenders for the replacement of the condemned Memorial Hall Play Park equipment. All are for recycled plastic and one offers a 30 year warranty. We will make a final decision at a special Council meeting on 19<sup>th</sup> December and, subject to approval, we hope the work will start soon afterwards and be completed by early March.

#### Successful Flooding Solution in Modbury!




Devon County Council (DCC) has informed us that the Flood Alleviation scheme that serves the town has operated twice in the recent severe weather. The scheme consists of three earth embankments (bunds) as well as other drainage improvements in the town and is monitored by DCC. They were filling on Sunday 23rd November, mid-morning and in the early hours of Tuesday 26th November. As a result it's estimated that 4,000 cubic metres of water was captured and stored, rather than making its way down into the town which would have likely resulted in a significant flood event, impacting both residential and commercial properties.

This is the first time the scheme has been tested in earnest since its completion in 2018 and we are delighted with the outcome. DCC have thanked us, our local flood group, local landowners and Wakehams of Modbury for their vigilance and efforts during the storm in order to ensure that the best outcome possible was achieved.

In the New Year, we will be meeting with DCC to ensure that this coordinated response to extreme weather continues into the future.

#### Road Warden Scheme Update

As Modbury Parish Council's volunteer road warden, Rob West leads a small team dedicated MODBURY to repairing many of the smaller potholes throughout the parish and ensuring that all our salt bins are kept topped up in preparation for the icy winter conditions on our minor roads. They are not permitted to work on the A379, though. A separate team under the leadership of Councillor Bill Cole deals with some of the less serious road drainage problems, clearing gullies and buddle holes for instance. Buddle holes are holes or pipes that carry water through a hedge or bank as part of road drainage.

During the last year or so, the potholing team has repaired well over 150 potholes and the accompanying map shows the location of most of them. To do this, they have used over 100 packs of special repair compound which are delivered on a periodic basis to our store by Devon County Council.

After the pothole is cleaned out, the compound is shovelled in and then rammed down with a mobile petrol-driven compactor before being sealed with liquid bitumen. Although this can never be as good as a job undertaken by Devon Highways or their contractors using pneumatic drills and diggers with hot tarmac, it has meant that we have been able to prevent the smaller holes (which DCC won't touch) from getting bigger, saving DCC money and improving driving conditions and road safety for local people.

The Parish Council would like to thank Rob, Neil Tooley, Oliver Francis and Harry Sleeman on the potholing team

and Bill, Tom Vidler and Chris Lambart on the drainage team for their sterling work on behalf of our community.

#### Modbury May Fair -Where the money comes from and where it goes

Recent editions of the Modbury Messenger have carried stories from some of Modbury's wonderful organisations that received a grant from the May Fair last year. It occurred to me that some accounting of how the money is raised and distributed might be of interest to more than just the May Fair Committee, so below is a summary showing the key numbers.

Last year, there was a Ceilidh on the first weekend, which was hard work for our volunteers, but was enjoyed by all and hopefully will be repeated this year. It raised £250. The traditional Market Stalls on Saturday morning made £270 and the good folk of the "allotmenteers" added a further £120 from their takings. The Carnival on the theme of "Modbury goes to the Olympics" was fun and collected £300, down on the year before and much less than a few years ago, when we all had coins in our pockets to toss into the buckets or the Fire Brigade's tarpaulin. (Perhaps everyone should put out a jar to collect coins during the year in readiness for next year's fair, Ed)

The Treasure Hunt is always challenging and although the entrance fee goes on the prize money, the treasure hunt ends at the Church in time for their delicious teas – which contributed a magnificent £360. Monday brings the crowning and associated games (£300), the duck race (£450!!) and the Mile. The Twinners' creperie donated £60 and Art on Broad Street, £70. During the week the Dog Show, run by the South Moor Vets, raised a lot of barks and £40; the Exeter Inn events, a generous £250; the Cubs beetled out a tenner and the Gospel Singers chimed in with £230. On the Friday, the Brownies Bingo made £320.

We must remember, that it isn't all about making money, it's about having a good time socialising in our wonderful community. To that end, we held a Picnic in the Park on the second Saturday with free entrance, music and games sponsored and organised by Bombers. In addition, we get very generous contributions from Luscombe Maye (sponsoring the Modbury Mile) and Marchand Petit (sponsoring the Carnival).

In total, we received £3,900 and spent £1,488 (insurance, publicity, road and car park closures, carnival bands, replacement equipment etc) a surplus of £2,412.

We donated funds totalling £2,860 to nine organisations; the Scouts and Cubs for some compasses and tents; Modbury Vixens for some training gear; MODWAG for some monitoring kit; the Brownies for some equipment for their kitchen; the litter pickers for some safety signs and bigger tongs; Marvellous Modbury for some flags to decorate the centre of the Town; the Messenger and Modbury Caring for essential computer equipment and finally St George's for refurbishment of important services in part of the building!

Thanks have to go to all the organisations, businesses and individuals that work so hard to make the May Fair a success every year, and to all of you who attend events and participate so enthusiastically in them. For this year we could do with some more volunteers to help run events, so don't be shy!

#### Modbury Parish Council - Meet the Councillors

Modbury Parish Council is short of four Parish Councillors, and especially of those who represent young families' needs, so perhaps a volunteer or two from the new Palm Cross estate could be persuaded to join the Council.

But first, a bit about our Council. Modbury Parish Council is composed of residents of the parish of Modbury and Brownston who really care about the parish, its activities, its people and its structure. The Council should be made up of 12 members but currently it is four members short. I have to admit that I find this surprising and worrying, especially as Modbury has expanded enormously over the last decade and now has a huge new and lovely estate full of young families. There is only one meeting of Councillors a month in the evening, when issues are discussed and resolved for the benefit of the whole community. So I have been in touch with several councillors to find out what sort of people they are, and to try and encourage four more Modbury Parish residents to step up to fill the available four slots. It really is important to have a full and active Parish Council.

Secondly, what is OUR Council's view or strategy as to what the future holds for Modbury? This is of paramount importance so here is their vision, and their values for the future of Modbury:

- Work to improve the quality of life for present and future generations;
- Maintain and improve the public spaces and the aesthetic appearance of Modbury for residents and visitors;
- Protect our environment and ensure the sustainability of our natural resources now and in the future;
- Support the continuing viability of businesses based in and around Modbury.
- To conduct our business with integrity, impartiality and transparency;
- To be a listening council, treating all views with courtesy and respect;
- To represent, and be an advocate and campaigning voice for, the residents of Modbury;
- To encourage engagement and involvement in the work of the Council;
- To work in partnership with other organisations to improve our services and deliver value for money.

Work that our Council is committed and/or contracted to undertake include:

- Management and maintenance of our play parks;
- Repair of potholes on minor routes within the parish;
- Grass cutting;
- Maintenance of public rights of way (P3);
- Drain and buddle hole clearing (buddle holes are holes or pipes that carry water through a hedge or bank as part of road drainage);
- Tree husbandry;
- Maintenance of our green spaces;
- Maintenance of council assets, which include car parking spaces at Palm Cross, benches and sports facilities

In Modbury, we are fortunate to have willing volunteers who undertake much of the practical work involved in these and other activities, and we thank them for their continued Involvement. Where volunteers are unavailable, or the specific role requires more regulated skills, the council contracts with external companies to provide the services required.

Here are three of the 8 current Councillors who have communicated their thoughts, aims and wishes for us.



#### **Barbara Price**

Barbara feels that living in Modbury has to be one of the best places to live in Britain and is the main reason why she and Tony, now also a Modbury councillor, moved here from Surrey after many holidays over the years in and around the area. After what seemed to have been a lifetime in the National Health Service and the Charity Sector, she looked forward to a lazy retirement in a peaceful and pleasant place. She loves walking and swimming at Bigbury with their dog, Alfie, but as she is passionate about the community, and particularly about social care, social housing, supporting a fair deal for all, accessibility, carers' support, and environmental issues. Barbara got involved to make things happen. She

currently chairs the Parish Council and represents the Council as a Trustee on the Modbury Sick Poor Fund. Mistletoe (Viscum album) is not uncommon around Modbury, though rarer than in many other parts of the UK. It is one of 1500 species of mistletoe, but the only one native to the Mistletoe is, famously, a parasitic plant. Strictly, it is a partial parasite as it British Isles. photosynthesises.

Mistletoe has evolved alongside other species. In this country, the mistle thrush plays a major role in the spreading of mistletoe to new sites. The sticky contents of mistletoe berries adhere to the beak of the thrush which then wipes its beak on branches of trees thus spreading the seeds. Mistletoe grows on more than 200 tree species, but in this country is generally associated with apple and ash trees.

Medicinally mistletoe has historically been used for treating arthritis, high blood pressure, epilepsy and infertility. In the first century AD, Dioscorides found that mistletoe cured external tumours. It is still used for treating cancer but without evidence to support this.

Our mistletoe is poisonous, causing symptoms such as nausea and vomiting, as well as diarrhoea and blurred vision. It is not usually fatal.



The ancient Greeks called mistletoe "Oak Sperm", but in this country there are probably less than a dozen examples of mistletoe growing on oak trees. The Romans associated mistletoe with peace, love and understanding.

They hung it over doorways to protect the household. In Christian times, this led to the tradition of lovers kissing under the mistletoe to protect from witches and demons.

In early Christian times, however, mistletoe was banned due to its association with paganism. This seems to have stemmed from a belief that mistletoe was used in a Druid ceremony which involved sacrifice of bulls. At this time, the Romans had banned human sacrifice, but continued to sacrifice animals. Christians, of course, preferred self sacrifice. Pliny the elder (1st century AD), in his "Natural History", records that Druid priests climbed oak trees and cut down mistletoe with golden sickles. Two white bulls were then sacrificed. However, this is the only record of this practice though it has since been commemorated in artworks. In this country, mistletoe is rarely seen on oak trees. Pliny's main interest was in the Spanish and German area, and I don't believe he ever came to Britain. What little evidence there is suggests that the Druids confined their use of mistletoe to medicinal.

#### Storm Bert – Learning the Lessons

If ever we needed reminding about the potential for damaging weather events affecting our MODBURY area, Storm Bert, which hit the UK on 22 November last, provided it.



In under 48 hours, parts of Dartmoor received over 175mm of rainfall, coupled with high winds, and parts of South Wales and other areas of southern and central England experienced major flooding. Whilst rainfall totals in



and around Modbury were much lower, they were still high enough to trigger the flood defences built ground the town in 2018, as an article elsewhere in this edition confirms.

Fortunately, whilst our parish emergency response was readied, it was not needed. In Modbury itself, flooding was limited to areas of Dark Lane, Back St and Church St, mostly caused by leaves and other debris blocking gullies and drains. Thanks to the efforts of local residents, damage to properties was limited and we would like to thank all those who were involved. Outside Modbury, the impact was more serious with landslips affecting the Sheepham road and many other roads being impassable to all bar four-wheel drive vehicles with higher ground clearances. Devon Highways had their work cut out to restore the network over the following week.

Since the storm, the Parish Council has successfully asked for the worst of roads to receive a street sweep by South Hams DC to remove leaves and debris and Devon Highways will be arranging for the gulley sucker to attend to the most problematic drains.

The Parish Council will be reviewing its emergency plan in the light of this event and will hopefully be prepared for further extreme weather events in the future.



#### MODBURY COMMUNITY WASSAIL

#### This year's Wassail is on Saturday 18th January at 6:00pm

If you have not attended Modbury's Wassail before, you have missed a treat and a now well-established Modbury tradition.

There has been a big resurgence in Wassail ceremonies in villages and towns all over Devon, where its history goes back hundreds of years. The Community Orchard Group now has three community orchards in Millennium Meadow, Galpin Street and Palm Cross.

The Wassail takes place in the Millennium Meadow and Wassailers (not a reggae group) gather by the Co-op in Burns Lane at 6:00pm to rehearse some ancient Wassail carols and chants before processing along Fuller's Ope to a candle-lit orchard. Here they are welcomed by our town crier.

Along the way, there is much banging of pots and pans to scare off evil sprites and spirits from the orchard, before the trees are blessed for a bumper crop of apples in the autumn.

A Lord and Lady of Misrule will have been chosen from pupils at the school and they will undertake the traditions of placing a piece of bread on a stick and dipping it in our hand-turned oak Wassail bowl, which contains apple juice from last year's harvest. The bread is then placed in a branch of a selected tree and the apple juice poured at its base, symbolising the orchard's cycle of life.

In past times, the apple crop would have been a source of income, so anything that might help provide a good crop was encouraged. Wassail carols and chants reflect this wish for a bountiful harvest. A typical one refers to: "Hats full, caps full, Good bushel sacks full, My pockets too. Hoorah!"

The term Wassail is from Anglo Saxon times and means "be of good health" to which the traditional reply is "drink hael". You can expect an enthusiastic response from Wassailers every time they hear the word Wassail in the ceremony.

Once the traditions have been observed the Wassail concludes with everyone being offered mulled apple juice and hot dogs. Maybe that's what entices so many people out on a dark winter's night in mid-January. But perhaps it's because it is a fun event for all the family that kicks off Modbury's annual calendar of community get togethers.

So grab torches, lanterns, old pots, pans and a stick to bang them with. Pull on your boots or wellies and a warm coat. If you want to feel like a seasoned Wassailer, take a hat and adorn it with whatever you think suitable for a country celebration. You really cannot be too outrageous – the more eclectic the better.



#### Coastguards Beach is Poor Quality Bathing Water

Only three bathing waters in Devon and Cornwall are classified as poor; disappointingly, Coastguards is one of them.



The Environment Agency (EA) released the 2024 classifications for bathing water in England on Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup> November. Of the 155 bathing waters in Devon and Cornwall, where the Environment

Agency takes weekly tests for water quality from May to September, only three achieved a 'Poor' rating. Disappointingly Coastguards Beach at the mouth of the River Erme was one of them; neighbouring Mothecombe Beach was classified as 'Good'.

Wild About The Erme River (WATER) is an environmental charity focused on restoring water quality and habitat throughout the catchment of the Erme, from source to sea. It has been monitoring the Environment Agency's data as well as conducting its own testing as part of a Citizen Science project.

This was the first year of Bathing Water designation for Coastguards Beach. It followed a long campaign led by Emily Woodley on behalf of WATER and supported by over a thousand members of the local community and Surfers Against Sewage.



WATER is very much a fact-based, science-led charity hence the emphasis on data and testing.

Bathing Water classifications are based on the level of Faecal Indicator Organisms e.g. E coli, found in the water. Elevated levels of these organisms were found in a number of the EA tests at Coastguards resulting in the 'Poor' classification. They were also found at testing points further upstream, one on the Erme at Ermington and the other on the Ayleston Brook at Modbury that feeds into the Erme. Both test points were downstream of waste water treatment works.

In 2022, South West Water's own investigation into water quality in the vicinity of the Erme Estuary proposed Ultra Violet Biological Treatment be installed at both the Ermington and Modbury Treatment Works. WATER understands that these upgrades are in the current SWW asset improvement plan but have not yet started.

Commenting on the Environment Agency's announcement, Lizzie Cresswell, Community Water Quality Officer at Surfers Against Sewage said: "With sites that are designated as 'Poor', regulators are obliged to prevent, reduce, and eliminate sources of pollution. This is a critical lever for driving change and investment – but we need to keep holding polluters and regulators to account. Currently, a site that gets 'Poor' for five years risks being de-designated and simply swept under the rug. That's unacceptable for the wild waters we love to swim, surf and paddle in.

Emily Woodley, who led the Coastguards Beach Bathing Water campaign said:

"The categorisation of Coastguards Beach as 'Poor' is disappointing, but sadly not a surprise. However, a single word can hide the complexities of how Bathing Water quality is calculated and what this actually means for water users.

Coastguards Beach is at the mouth of a tidal estuary. Pollution levels in fresh water from upstream will impact on the water quality at the estuary but this varies. The proportion of fresh water is greater at low tide but as the tide comes in the fresh water is somewhat overwhelmed by the volume of salt water.

Charlotte Grezo, WATER's Chair commented: "Achieving bathing water status for Coastguards meant the Environment Agency were independently monitoring water quality. Their findings require them to investigate further to trace pollution sources, which may be multiple, and ensure remedial action is taken. We welcome their engagement in this process of continual improvement."

#### **JANUARY 2008**

So, 17 years ago, the Modbury Messenger was into volume 11, it was still not in colour, and this issue was 12 pages with only one photograph – black and white! Today's Messenger is 24 pages long and in full colour.

There was an invite on page 1 to attend the Modbury Fair 2008 Meeting at The Modbury Inn as helpers were still needed, it was submitted by Pauline Ryder, Fair Co-ordinator.

On page 4, there was a thank you column, with three entries, the first from Heather Winstanley for financial help with the cost of a Music Theatre course, the second from MSF (Medicins sans Frontieres) for £406 raised at a Kingsbridge Market and thirdly, a thanks to those who attended a soup and roll lunch in the Church which raised £705.34, a donation being made to the Pavilion Project.

Jeff Booth wrote "The Green Corner" questioning the waste of food bought commercially (estimated at £424 per year per household) and urging people to grow as much as they could themselves and buy locally.

The school report mentioned year 2 pupils had been interviewed by Westcountry Television about their New Year's Resolutions. (If anyone reading this remembers that event, do tell the Messenger about it.)

The highlight of the issue was on the front page, where a letter to the people of Modbury from the Prime Minister, Gordon Brown, was replicated.

#### 10 Downing Street


I want to pay tribute to the people of Modbury for leading the way in the campaign to reduce the environmental impact of plastic bags. It is the campaigns in Modbury and across the country which convince me that we can eliminate single-use disposable bags altogether in favour of long-lasting and more sustainable alternatives.

In partnership with government, the supermarkets have already committed to reduce the environmental impact of plastic bags by 25% over the next year. And now we will convene a forum of the supermarkets, the British Retail Consortium and other interested groups to assess urgently together, how we can do even better.

But all of us - government, business, civil society and individuals - all have an important part to play in improving our environment and tackling climate change. The people of Modbury can be proud of the leadership they have shown.
